

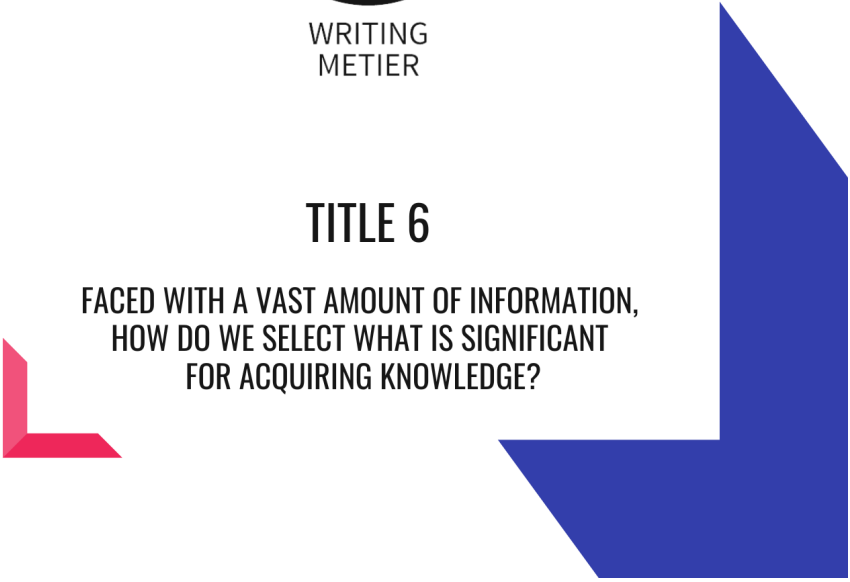

HOW DO WE SELECT WHAT IS SIGNIFICANT
FOR ACQUIRING KNOWLEDGE?

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We are continually inundated with excessive information in the digital age. History:

Additionally, they should be conscious of their prejudices and limits and try to view historical events objectively and objectively.
